
From the Board of Trustees



Budget Plan & Code of Virginia

More than 80% of the VMNH annual budget is directed toward collections care and curation, supporting research relevant to the natural and cultural heritage of Virginia within a global context, and making the collections and knowledge accessible to all citizens of the Commonwealth. Research & Collections personnel represent the largest complement of staff at the museum, with the division having doubled in size over the past decade thanks to the vision and priorities set forth by the Board of Trustees. Their vision is inspired by the Code of Virginia.

Archaeology & The Cultural Heritage Monitoring Lab

The VMNH Archaeology department modeled the future impacts from extreme weather events to over 48,000 archaeological sites in Virginia. Its study will assis the Commonwealth of Virginia, Tribal governments, and private landowners in safeguarding Virginia's archaeological resources.

The museum's Cultural Heritage Monitoring Lab (CHML) teamed with the Smithsonian Institution to monitor over 28,000 cultural heritage sites in Ukraine using satellite technology. In the past year, this work has been featured in *The New York Times, Washington Post, The Guardian, PBS News Hour, NPR, CNN, Bloomberg, The Telegraph, Smithsonian Magazine, VOX, and Politico.*

Paleontology

A National Science Foundation grant was awarded to VMNH Paleontology, in collaboration with Dr. Brooke Haiar of the University of Lynchburg, to support an ongoing fossil expedition in Wyoming. The grant also provides for student fellowships to attend fieldwork and intern at VMNH.







Herpetology

VMNH Assistant Curator of Herpetology Dr. Arianna Kuhn established the first ever VMNH Herpetology Lab and frozen tissue collection. Complementing this advancement, the first field collection programs and research projects have also been initiated with regional university and agency partners to build these collections.

Invertebrate Zoology


The first invertebrate frozen tissue for VMNH was established to support ongoing research in centipedes, millipedes, and other soil-inhabiting arthropods of Virginia and the southeastern United States. The collection currently consists of more than 180 target taxa.

Mammalogy

VMNH Curator of Mammalogy Dr. Nancy Moncrief received the 2023 Dr. Henry S. Mosby Award from the Virginia Chapter of the Wildlife Society for her "significant contributions to wildlife species and their habitats, and to the citizens of Virginia." Because of her research that used museum specimens of mice to study the Lyme disease pathogen, Dr. Moncrief was interviewed for an article that appeared in *The Scientist*.



Education & Outreach (July 1, 2022 to June 30, 2023)





Museum education programs are delivered by an elite science staff both at the museum and via outreach within Virginia classrooms. All areas of the Commonwealth are accessible, and virtual programming is available. All education experiences are designed to underscore Virginia science and social studies Standards of Learning. Over 690 Education department programs served nearly 13,000 students during 2022-2023. Corporate Partners and philanthropists have provided funds to make many programs free of cost

Targeting Key Audiences

VMNH education staff utilized specific programs to capture age groups 3-5 and 6-11 through its *Doodle Bugs* and *Summer Adventure Camps*, respectively. In addition, the *Homeschool Science & Engineering Academy* provided strong curriculum for homeschool families in STEM-based topics through highly interactive classroom lessons.

Strategic Initiatives

IMLS Grant Programs

The Education and Research & Collections departments collaborated on an Institute of Museum and Library Services (IMLS) grant in support of the museum's *Scope it Out!* initiative aimed at bolstering the museum's science education programs and outreach activities. The initiative established a one-of-a-kind Exploration Lab featuring research-quality microscopy equipment that fosters discovery, problem solving, and critical thinking via eyes-on and hands-on learning opportunities for students of all ages. Since the lab opened in December 2022, over 800 students have participated in various microscopy programs.

JMU Kid Wind Partnership

Over 70 students from across the region participated in the *Wind and Solar*Challenge hosted at VMNH and coordinated by the James Madison University

Center for the Advancement of Sustainable Energy.

VMNH Waynesboro

VMNH educators from Charlottesville, as well as Martinsville, partnered with several Waynesboro schools for programming over the past year. Programs highlighted information regarding the future museum branch campus.

Museums for All

Thanks to Corporate Partnership support from Hooker Furnishings and Carter Bank & Trust, the VMNH *Museums for All* program allowed SNAP Benefits users the opportunity to attend museum events and visit the exhibit galleries free of charge. Over 3,200 visitors were served by the *Museums for All* program.




VMNH has secured a contractor for the Jean S. Adams Education Pavilion
